Hi Neighbors,

Congratulations, Beaverdale. Celebrating a neighborhood's Centennial is a once in a lifetime opportunity and I think we more than rose to the occasion.

It was wonderful to see Beaverdale residents new and old at the completion of our Beaverdale Centennial Mural with Ben Schuh at the last Beaverdale Farmer's Market. People exchanged stories about the neighborhood and we were able to explain the history that went into the Mural. Everything down to the railroad ties hidden in the lettering show that this beautiful piece of public art is steeped in our collective history. Thanks to the generous donations from folks across the community, I'm proud to report that the entire project will likely be paid off by the end of the year.

Birthdays, of course, require a birthday cake. Leave it to Eugene Buckmiller to design and build the massive Beaverdale Centennial birthday cake float that he proudly pulled with his restored tractor in the Fall Festival parade this year. We were ready to pay him back for it, but he very generously donated it as a gift to our neighborhood. The beaver popping out of the top of the cake started out as a far flung idea but he made it a reality.

The Mural and the Fall Festival were the perfect capstone to the efforts of so many people throughout this year. The banners all along Beaver Avenue showed pictures of our shared history over many decades. During the spring, we celebrated the return of the Beaverdale Brick beer at a Bar Crawl throughout Beaverdale with Confluence Brewing. We sold hundreds of Centennial pint glasses at that event

which helped pay for the Mural. It sounds like we'll be having at least one more with a new pint glass before the year is up. The pint glasses along with shirts, coffee mugs, prints, yard signs, and flags will hopefully be keepsakes that our children and grandchildren will all enjoy someday.

Everything seemed to have a big, Centennial feel about it this year. We had our biggest Beaverdale Bluegrass Festival ever with the Beaverdale Business Coalition in July. Our Beaverdale Garden Walk had numbers similar to the Tour of Homes last year and was also our biggest yet. All of the editions of the Sidewalk this year have also been special Centennial editions laden with all of the neighborhood history we could find.

On a personal note, serving in this role for this important year was one of the pleasures of my life. As I get ready to transition off the board in February, I can't think of a higher note to leave on. The dozens of people on the four different neighborhood boards and on our Centennial Commission never shot down a single idea from anyone. Some worked. Some didn't. We did everything we could think of and we're all the better for it.

TIMELESS BEAVERDALE — MURAL PAINTING COMPLETED! MORE THAN 70 CURRENT AND FORMER RESIDENTS WITNESSED ITS COMPLETION

The painting of the Beaverdale Centennial Mural started in July and continued through the first week of September. We commemorated the completion of the Mural with artist, Ben Schuh, during the Beaverdale Farmer's Market on September 5, 2017. More than 70 current and former Beaverdale residents were there to witness the signing of the Mural. We also talked about the history of the Mural and some of the images depicted in it. The goal all along was to

commemorate our Centennial and to create a piece of public art that people will always want to look at and to take their pictures with, hence the name "Timeless Beaverdale." We were pleased to see kids already taking pictures with it the same night that it was completed. We hope that it lasts for many years as a testament to this wonderful year and to our incredible neighborhood.

Limited edition prints of the Beaverdale Centennial Mural are still available for purchase.

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The "Timeless Beaverdale" title is underscored by the old coal mine at what would now be 34th and Urbandale.



This image was taken on an iPhone and shows the crowd at our first Beaverdale Bluegrass Festival in July 2016. It was the first Festival held at Tower Park and surprised everyone involved when more than 1,000 people showed up for the night of musical performers from across the Midwest.



The house (center) represents one of the "Beaverdale Bricks" that we're best known for. The inspiration was from a picture of 4119 Ovid (left) that was likely taken in the early 90's for inspiration for what would become the Beaverdale logo. We believe the actual house for the Beaverdale logo can be found at 4200 Franklin Avenue (right). It's represented in our Beaverdale Centennial logo at the far left of the mural.



This picture was dated 1914 and shows one of the Beaverdale streetcars as it sat on the trolley loop at 70th & Roseland. The woman sitting on the fender is 18 year old Inza Ruth Cruikshank. We believe the motorman on the right is Jack Dennis, who worked on the rails from 1914 to 1954. Thanks to local historian, Earl Short, for his help piecing some of the trolley history together.



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BEAVERDALE FALL FESTIVAL 2017 ONE FOR THE RECORD BOOKS!

We set out to throw the biggest, baddest, most bodacious Beaverdale Fall Festival ever this year... and we accomplished it! With the help of numerous sponsors, volunteers, vendors and merchants, the 2017 Centennial Celebration was one for the record books.

Friday night we had perfect weather to set up 55 food and non-food vendors as well as a carnival. Our third annual Car Night was a huge success – drawing more than 150 show cars to the South end of Beaver. There were so many cars in fact, that we ran out of room and had to turn people away! The cars, as well as the carnival, food vendors, and live music brought a huge crowd to the downtown Beaverdale area that night – it was a sight to behold.

Saturday morning, 18 Arts and Crafts vendors joined the festivities along with our first ever Beaverdale Fall Festival Dog Parade. Around 80 of our canine neighbors participated in the pooch parade. Judges picked the dog

with the "Most Beaverdale Spirit" as well as "Owner/Dog Look Alikes". A paws-itively perfect time was had by all.

Following the Dog Parade, the Fall Festival parade took off with 121 entries. This year there were 19 floats in our first ever float contest. Life Church of Des Moines took home 1st place, with Ocean Breeze Massage and Edward Jones in a close 2nd and 3rd.

A little bit of rain slowed things down on Saturday afternoon – but the show went on with lots of great food choices all day long. The Kid Zone was a big hit along with horse rides. The Festival ended with an Open Mic and lots of great music provided by Beaverdale merchants. A rain storm did close things down a bit early but that all goes along with an outdoor Festival! 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PRIVATE PROPERTY PROTECTION PROGRAM DSM RESIDENTS CAN RECEIVE UP TO \$1000 FOR WATERPROOFING THEIR BASEMENTS!

Beaverdale is a great community. Our people are friendly, our businesses are family-owned, and our homes have a lot of historical charm. But one thing that's not so great about Beaverdale: because most of our housing was built between 1920 and 1950, many of our homes are not watertight. Leaky and flooded basements have been known to wreak havoc on residents' personal belongings and threaten air quality and personal safety for residents.

Leaky basements can usually be fixed by something as simple as adding extra gutters and extending downspouts, or it could be a more complex solution that requires professional help. One effective solution is to install a sump pump and drain tile system. This project sounds daunting, but is actually an affordable and fairly simple process that a professional can complete within 1-2 days. Now is a great time to consider installing a waterproofing system, as the City of Des Moines will reimburse residents for 50% of the installed cost up to a maximum subsidy of \$1,000.

To receive the subsidy, you must submit a reimbursement application before June 1, 2023 for the installation of a sump pump. The sump pump must be installed in an existing Des Moines home, by a licensed plumber, and that plumber must pull a City permit prior to installing the system. (New construction is ineligible for the subsidy.) Note that there will be a fee to pull the permit, and the subsidy may be taxable; however, the permit fee and taxes are typically well below the potential \$1,000 in savings. This program is a fantastic way to update your home, improve your property's resale value, and provide peace of mind during those rainy spring days which you may have previously spent shop-vacuuming.

We also talked about sprucing up the Watch Program signs you see on the utility poles along the streets. Additionally, we are encouraging Watch Captains to join the Facebook Group "Beaverdale Block Captains". This Facebook group allows Watch Captains to share information which they can then pass on to other individual neighborhood watch groups.

And last, though by no means least, we introduce Officer Steph Swartz of the Des Moines Police Department, our dedicated Beaverdale-area police officer. Officer Swartz brings many years of service as both a detective and narcotics officer with the DMPD. She is also a member of the "Beaverdale Block Captains" Facebook group, allowing her to be aware of any neighborhood watch activity and to communicate directly with Neighborhood Watch Captains.





OFFICER STEPHANIE SWARTZ BEAVERDALE HAS A NEW NEIGHBORHOOD POLICE OFFICER!

Beaverdale has a new Neighborhood Police Officer we asked her a few questions to get to know her better! Q: What is your official title? A: Senior Police Officer

Q: Tell us how and when you started working for the Police department?

A: I worked in molecular biology/genetics research for 12 years before becoming an officer. I wanted to find a job with more tangible results at the end of the work day and more public contact. I settled on police officer and after 5 tries was hired by Des Moines.

Q: Tell us about someone who has influenced your decision to become a police officer.

A: My wife. She was and is an amazing nurse and always had these wonderful stories about people she had been able to help. I am a huge chicken about needles so I knew nursing was out, but I started looking around for a public service job that fit. Q: What do you find most challenging about being a Police Officer?

A: Staying hopeful and positive when sometimes our job involves seeing the worst that people can do and the worst that can happen to them.

Q: What is your favorite part of the job?

A: That moment when you change something – someone's view, someone's day, maybe even someone's life.

Q: What's the best/worst thing to happen since you started working with the Des Moines Police?

A: Best day ever - the day I helped push a car in a neighborhood not known for friendly police relations. One of the neighborhood members was so surprised he came up to me to tell me thank you. Worst day ever – The day we lost Sgt. Beminio 11/2/16.

Q: What was your reaction when you were assigned to Beaverdale?

A: Super excited!!!

Q: What was your first impression of Beaverdale?

A: I went to Holy Trinity as a child, so I was forever running around Beaverdale. I remember the beautiful brick houses, and the homey feeling of the area.

Q: What's your first memory of Beaverdale?

A: Probably involved Sister Mary Karen not being very happy with me. :)

Q: What would you say are some of Beaverdale's strongest qualities as a community? A: The strong connection the neighbors feel towards one another and the community as a whole.

Q: What might (someone) be surprised to know about you?

A: I have 11 grandkids.

Q: The interest in Beaverdale crime seems to be growing. Why do you think that is? A: I think Beaverdale recognizes the strong quality of life they have and doesn't want that to begin to erode.

Q: What would you tell someone who is concerned about safety in the neighborhood?

A: Observation and communication are the keys. Be our eyes and ears.

Q: If you weren't a Police officer, what would you be doing instead, or what would your life be like?

A: I have always wanted to be a foreign correspondent.

Q: How would someone describe you?

- A: Outgoing and enthusiastic.
- Q: What do you do when you aren't keeping Des Moines safe?
- A: Swim with the grandkids, bike, and kayak.

Q: Tell us about your family.

A: My wife is an inpatient psychiatric nurse at Mercy. We have been together for 23 years and have four now-grown children who in turn have blessed us with eleven beautiful grandkids.

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BEAVERDALE'S GO-TO GUY FOR TOOLS, TENTS AND BRIGHT IDEAS

In the fall of 2009, Beaverdale resident CeCe Ibson (then a widow with two little kids) hired her long-time handyman, Wendell Eck, and his son Brian Eck to remodel her family room and install new carpet in the house. Little did they know it would be the beginning of long-term relationships between CeCe and Wendell, and Wendell and Beaverdale.

Since moving officially to the neighborhood in 2010, Wendell has thrown himself (sometimes even voluntarily) into neighborhood projects and events. Wendell has worked on and at Shop Hop, built and driven floats and cars in the Fall Festival parade, worked various booths and tables at Farmers Market, Beaverdale Live and Fall Festival and helped many neighbors and businesses with projects, from little leaks to ceiling collapses.

When the BNA, the BBC or some other neighborhood group needs a tool, a tent or just a bright idea, Wendell is the man to call. He and Joe Raymond took on the entirety of the mechanicals for the Beaverdale Bluegrass Festival when it moved to Tower Park in 2016, putting in more hours than probably anyone on that event.

Wendell has made recycling at neighborhood events a priority and has also worked to link BNA and BBC events with other neighborhood-based groups, including the Boy Scouts, Knights of Columbus and Holy Trinity Parish.

In 2015, Wendell began a remodeling project on his and CeCe's house,

prompting CeCe to volunteer them for the first ever Tour of Homes in 2016. Wendell finished up the night before the Tour, just in time to take CeCe's son and his Boy Scout troop on a weekend camping trip, leaving CeCe at home to take credit for all of Wendell's work over the past year.

This is probably as good a time as any for Wendell to learn that CeCe is planning to volunteer their home for Garden Walk next time around.



Wendell Eck married CeCe Ibson in 2012. Together, they have 6 children, 6 grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

After a 40 year career in the carpenter trades, Wendell retired in 2015 to work for CeCe. In hindsight, he probably should have put a little more thought into that decision.
