
As we do each month, we encourage you to get your COVID vaccine shot if you have not already. <u>You can get COVID-19 information here.</u>

Assistance Is Available To Eliminate Lead Poisoning

Lead-based paint: It's not something that is top of mind in everyday life, but it's essential to understand. Lead-based paint is the primary source of lead poisoning in children in lowa. The good news is: Lead poisoning is 100% preventable. Currently, November Neighborhood Newsletter

about 75,000 housing units in Polk County were built before lead-based paint was banned in 1978.

Making homes lead safe can prevent exposure to brain-damaging hazards. If you own a home built before 1978 and have children under the age of 6, contact the Polk County Lead Poisoning Prevention Program at (515) 286-2115 to ensure your home receives the needed repairs to become a leadsafe home.

You can also visit <u>Polk</u> <u>County Health</u> <u>Department</u> for more information.

The good news: Lead poisoning is **100%** preventable.

Take these steps to make your home lead-safe.



Talk with your child's doctor about a simple blood lead test. If you are pregnant or nursing, talk with your doctor about exposure to sources of lead.



Talk with your local health department about testing paint and dust in your home for lead if you live in a home built before 1978.



Renovate safely. Common renovation activities (like sanding, cutting, replacing windows, and more) can create hazardous lead dust. If you're planning renovations, use contractors certified by the Environmental Protection Agency (visit www.epa.gov/lead for information).



Remove recalled toys and toy jewelry from children and discard as appropriate. Stay up-to-date on current recalls by visiting the Consumer Product Safety Commission's website: www.cpsc.gov.

Women of History Honored with Iowa Achievement Awards

Women Lead Change, a national organization dedicated to the development, advancement and promotion of women, recently announced four honorees for the 2022 Iowa Women of Achievement Awards. This award recognizes the contributions of historical Iowa women who made outstanding and lasting contributions to the citizens of Iowa, the United States, and the world.

To further recognize these essential women of history, the City of Des Moines will add permanent plaques on the Iowa Women of Achievement Bridge downtown.

Below are the four Iowa women that were honored in 2022.



Mary J. Whitely Coggeshall (1836-1911)

Mary J. Whitely Coggeshall was a state and national leader, orator, and writer in the suffrage movement. She was also recognized as the "Mother of woman suffrage in lowa."



Dr. Christine Grant (1936-2021)

Dr. Christine Grant was the first Director of Women's Athletics at the University of Iowa. She was also a strong advocate for Title IX, and a founding member of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women.

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Maria, Running Moccasins, Pearson (1932-2003)

Maria, Running Moccasins, Pearson was an internationally known American Indian leader who was considered the "Mother of Repatriation." She worked closely with former Iowa Governor Robert Ray to create the Iowa Burials Protection Act.

LaMetta Wynn (1933-2021)

LaMetta Wynn become the first black woman to hold the position of mayor in any lowa municipality, being elected as the Mayor of Clinton in 1995. She also secured \$50 million in federal aid for the city of Clinton by working with Washington D.C. lawmakers.

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Meet the New NBSD Commander

Lt. Tina Kalar was recently appointed as the commander of the Des Moines Police Department's Neighborhood Based Service Delivery Unit (NBSD).

She has been with the DMPD for 23 years, working in various units including patrol, vice and narcotics, traffic, administrative services, and personnel and training. Her previous position was assistant commander at the Des Moines Police Academy.



After graduating from high school in 1993, Lt. Kalar enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where she served both on active duty and in the Air National Guard. She is currently the first sergeant of the 132d Medical Group, Iowa National Guard. Her deployments include Saudi Arabia, Afghanistan, Qatar, and the United Arab Emirates. In 2021, Lt. Kalar was selected as First Sergeant of the Year in Region 4 which includes the states of Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Minnesota, and Ohio.

The NBSD is a unique program that provides a dedicated police officer to specific neighborhoods where they serve as an officer residents can contact. Officer's duties in this role include:

- Monitoring traffic
- Enforcing parking ordinances
- Taking police reports
- Participating in neighborhood association meetings
- Participating in neighborhood events
- Assisting zoning inspectors, public works, and park and recreation staff
- Coordinating police/community outreach programs

It's election season for neighborhood associations!

Board transitions can disrupt the daily operations of a neighborhood association. The **Board Transition Checklist** – found in the **Neighborhood Association Toolkit** – removes some of the stress of transition and helps ensure a smooth transfer of critical files. Use the checklist to identify documents and tasks that need to be transferred to the new board members and to set expectations on deadlines and accountability.

Remember to send me an updated board of directors so that new leaders can begin to receive information and resources from City officials.
