Hi Neighbors,

I'm writing this president's letter on Monday, April 8, 2019. It is nearly 80 degrees and you've probably seen me driving the neighborhood with the top down on my old Mustang convertible. Our annual **Easter Egg Hunt** will be this Saturday. I'm told parts of the state will see 12 - 16 inches of snow between now and then. Welcome to spring in Iowa!

I was privileged to be elected to a final two-year term and to a second term as president of the Beaverdale Neighborhood Association board of directors at our February 12, 2019 annual meeting. Board members "term off" after three, two-year terms on the Board, not including time spent as an appointed member (filling out an unexpired term). I was appointed to the Board in 2013 and will retire in 2021.

At that same meeting, Jay Kozel, Eddie Fishman, Chris Friest and Nick Mertes, all of whom I appointed to fill out unexpired terms this past year, were elected to their first twoyear terms. Tom LaPointe, Brent Millis, Kate Ross and Stacy Smith were elected to their second terms. Kimberely Strope-Boggus was elected to a third (and final) term.

At the Board's February 2019 meeting, we were asked to consider a resolution in support of the **local option sales tax**, on the ballot in March. After first voting on whether we should take a position at all, the Board voted unanimously to endorse the tax as flood-related infrastructure remediation and improvement are among the projects to which anticipated revenue will be allocated. The ballot measure passed, with more than 70% of voters approving.

Also at our February meeting, Board member Adam Plagge suggested making meeting minutes, agendas and other neighborhood-related documents, pictures, etc, available on our website. Several months ago, Sean Bagniewski dropped off a number of plastic storage totes, our neighborhood archives in paper form. Adam has taken on the job of scanning all of these materials (which is going to take a good, long time).

On the subject of our **website**, Board members **Kate Ross** and **Brent Millis** are working with our third party vendor on a number of improvements, to both the security and the functionality of the site. Board members have reported off-and-on receiving emails from me asking them to buy iTunes gift cards or reply to schedule a meeting. We believe these emails were coming from or through the website (clearly, I'm not the techie on the Board). Remember, the only e-mail address I use is **ibsonlaw@yahoo.com**.

As I reported at the annual meeting, for the first time in many years, Beaverdale was a finalist for CityView's **Best Community in Which to Live,** part of their "Best of the Best" party and issue. I'm told that the category was changed from "Best Neighborhood" to "Best Community" because Beaverdale won so often. This year, we finished second. To Waukee. That's about all I'll say on this subject. In March, the Board unanimously passed a resolution in support of We Can Build It, LLC and Jeff Young's plan for the former **Franklin Jr. High.** Their application for rezoning was approved on April 4, 2019. I am personally very excited about what this project will bring to Beaverdale. Plans call for a boutique hotel, restaurant with outdoor patio space, large auditoriums for concerts and other events and a brewery, among other features.

The **City of Des Moines** continues to communicate with us and keep us in the loop regarding infrastructure repairs and improvements, along with other flood-related and general public work and projects. We do our best to update social media as events, meetings or start dates for projects are announced. City Council members **Bill Gray** and **Chris Coleman** do a great job for us and I thank them for their efforts.

Beaverdale Bluegrass Festival is right around the corner, from a planning standpoint. This year's Festival will be July 20, 2019 at Tower Park starting at 5:00 p.m. As always, I'm looking for volunteers to help with set-up, tear-down then throughout the event. Please e-mail me at ibsonlaw@yahoo.com if you can give us a couple hours. Also, we always prefer to "shop local" when it comes to vendors. If you are a local, licensed, food vendor and would like to work this event, let me know.

Please join the BNA at our next quarterly meeting on Tuesday, May 14 at 7 p.m. at the Northwest Community Center, 5110 Franklin Ave, Des Moines to hear updates on neighborhood events and projects. All residents are encouraged to attend, listen and respectfully share their concerns on these subjects. By working together, we can make this neighborhood even better than it is today! 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
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CITY SEWER & YOUR PROPERTY SUBSIDIES FOR PROPERTY PROTECTION PROGRAMS

The rain storm on July 1, 2018 that overwhelmed the storm sewer caused heartache for many Beaverdale residents. It brought our antiquated sewer to the fore front and demanded action by the city. The city is working hard to lay out plans to fix the sewer infrastructure and it is offering programs that subsidizes the cost for property protection devices and a program to help reduce storm water run-off.

The first program offers subsidies to help defray the cost for installing property protection devices such as sump pumps and backwater valves:

The Private Property Protection Program

This program will provide a subsidy to property owners within the City of Des Moines who contract with a licensed plumber to redirect one or more of the eligible sources of infiltration and inflow to an outlet other than the sanitary sewer system or to install a backwater valve on the private sewer service to protect against surcharges on the public sewer system.

With this program, the City will make a Private Property Protection Program subsidy reimbursement for 100% of the cost up to \$1,500 to the property owners who meet the requirements of the program. The reimbursement for approved work will be by direct payment to the property owner. Qualifying work eligible for funding include:

- The installation or redirection of a sump pump to discharge flows from foundation drains and area drains to a non-sanitary sewer outlet such as a rain garden, storm sewer, or the ground surface.
- The disconnection of roof leaders from the sanitary sewer service
- The installation of backwater valve.

Additionally, the city NEEDS OUR HELP to reduce storm water run-off that enters the sewer. In order to do this, the city is offering the following program:

Stormwater Best Management Practices Program

This program will provide a rebate to property owners who install stormwater best management practices to help to enhance the water quality of the stormwater runoff and/or decrease the amount of runoff that enters the stormwater drainage system.

With this program, the City will make a rebate reimbursement for 50% of the cost up to \$2,000 to property owners who meet the requirements of the program. The reimbursement for approved work will be by direct payment to the property owner in the amount of the qualifying work. Qualifying work eligible for funding:

- Bio-retention cells
- Streambank stabilization
- Rain Gardens
- Soil Quality Restoration
- Permeable pavement
- Rain barrels

• Other similar practices approved by the director

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WITMER PARK PROJECT UPDATE PUBLIC MEETING PLANNED FOR MAY 14TH

At its March 13th quarterly meeting, the Drake Neighborhood Association hosted members of the Witmer Park Project committee and staff from the City of Des Moines Parks & Recreation Department for a public meeting detailing the upcoming improvements to Witmer Park. The meeting consisted of a review of Phase 1 of the improvements (beginning this year and funded in part by an Iowa DNR REAP Grant), and the sharing of new information regarding Phase 2 (slated for 2020 construction).

The Phase 1 upgrades, announced in January 2018 by the City of Des Moines, include ecological improvements, a new walking path, a fishing pier, open air shelters, and the rehabilitation (including dredging and re-stocking) of Witmer's signature pond. Phase 2 is a collaboration of the Witmer Park Project (consisting of BNA and DNA members, as well as park neighbors) and the City of Des Moines. Its goal is to develop a restroom facility and new playground for the park.

At the public meeting, City staff shared the final design layout of the park, giving attendees a "birds-eye view" of what Witmer Park will look like after Phase 1 and Phase 2 improvements are completed. Three different playground renderings were also presented, and those in attendance voted on their favorite concept, as well as additional playground features that may be added to the final design. The most popular concept was the "Manta Ray" design.

Since that meeting, the Witmer Park Project committee has confirmed that new picnic tables, grill pits, and bike racks will be included as part of the park improvements. It has also learned that the existing play structure at the playground will be removed at some point this year (likely mid-to-late summer) to allow for the construction of the new Phase 1 trail. The play structure will be removed as late as is possible, and it is hoped that the swing set can be preserved until the new Phase 2 playground can be built. The Witmer Park Project committee and City of Des Moines Parks & Recreation Department would like to thank park visitors for their patience during this time of transition that will ultimately yield a vastly improved park.

Another public meeting about the project is scheduled for May 14th at the Beaverdale Neighborhood Association's quarterly meeting (7:00pm; Northwest Community Center – 5110 Franklin Ave.). At this meeting, City staff will present the final playground design concept in a few different color scheme options.
